# NATIONAL AND REGIONAL CHAPTER OF EXCELLENCE AWARDS

# LEADERSHIP DEVELOPMENT

In keeping with the theme of "Back to Basics: Rebirth. Rebuild. Reconnect", this year, ULGA-YP deepened its commitment to developing young professionals across Metro Atlanta to step into their greatness as the next generation of corporate, civic and community leaders. Through in person and online programming, ULGA-YP reached over 1000 professionals covering various topics.

**ELT Development:** ULGA-YP continues to dedicate resources to develop the skills of the ULGA-YP Executive Leadership Team through retreats and training. This year, ULGA-YP made a concerted effort to focus on succession planning by revamping the Vice Chair program, revising our Bylaws and instituting a new



Policies and Procedures Committee, and revamping the elections process to ensure that future ULGA-YP leaders are well prepared for board service.

- **ELT Retreat:** The three-day Executive Leadership Team (ELT) Retreat included a teambuilding activity where we learned about sustainability and planted a tree, trainings on event ideation and innovation and community engagement, and strategic planning (including getting to your "why", asset mapping, ELT theme brainstorming, calendar build, budget discussion, review of NULYP awards, etc).
- NULYP Trainings: Each member of the Executive Leadership Team attended their assigned NULYP training as organized periodically by the NULYP Executive Leadership Team to further develop their leadership skills at the local level and hear best practices from around NULYP. President Brittany Marshall attended the Presidents 101 training hosted by then NULYP President Ray Shackelford in Summer 2021.
- In-Kind Donation Training: An in-kind donation professional training and process implementation was
  administered by Amaris Clements, the 2021-2022 Fund Development Chair. During the training, she
  provided insight on how the ELT can maximize impact through leveraging the power of in-kind
  donations. The training centered on defining the utility of in-kind donations, how to source them, and the
  importance of internal tracking systems.
- Vice Chair Program: To ensure that our committee members are both well engaged and prepared to
  become the next leaders of our Executive Leadership, each standing Committee Chair appointed a Vice
  Chair to assist Committee Chairs in the management and oversight of the committee, lead special
  projects as assigned, and help recruit members to the committee. We are thankful for the contribution of

this year's Vice Chairs: John Clark (Advocacy), Shannon Woodward (Communications), Derrick Martin (Community Service), Aemon Weaver (Personal and Professional Development), and Kevin Osahon (Social and Cultural).

- Bylaws Revisions: This year, ULGA-YP Parliamentarian, Crystal Jordan, created a Policies and Procedures ad-hoc committee which led the revision of our Bylaws for the first time in three years. This allowed ULGA-YP members to provide input on the operations of our chapter and learn more about the process of revising organizational Bylaws.
- Elections Process and Candidate Bootcamp: This year, we revised our elections process to include an application, hosted a "Leading Within YP" panel discussion that consisted of past ULGA-YP leaders, and made enhancements to our candidate bootcamp to better prepare candidates for the election and to ensure candidates were clear on the expectations of each leadership role up for election.
- ELT Engagement Program: The purpose of the 2021-2022 ELT Engagement Program is to foster a sense of community amongst ELT members while advancing the mission and strategic goals of the ULGA-YP. Utilizing a points-based system, ELT members receive credit for activities completed throughout the term as it relates to teambuilding, chapter operations, and leadership development between October 1, 2021 and May 2, 2022. Example activities include attending social outings with their assigned ELT Small Group, welcoming new members in the ULGA-YP Slack, securing partnerships and sponsorships, and attending events of other NULYP chapters.

**General Body Meetings:** ULGA-YP hosts monthly General Body Meetings to enhance the personal and professional development skills of attendees. This year, we hosted 9 sessions, including one during Join Week 2021, that focused on key development topics to ensure that our members and guests are well-rounded and prepared to lead.

January 2021 – What's Your Roadmap to Success?: As we entered into a new year, ULGA-YP held a panel discussion featuring young entrepreneurs and corporate leaders to discuss strategies they've used on their personal journey to success. Topics included how to build a professional and business brand to give us a significant advantage in our careers and business to ultimately lead us down a path of success.

**February 2021 – Blast into The Future: Diversity in Tech:** As part of Join Week 2021, ULGA-YP hosted a General Body Meeting to celebrate the profound movements of tremendous individuals within the tech world. Our panelists shared how to break into the tech field and the necessary skills to help any young professional on their journey.

March 2021 - Level Up Service: A Call to Action!: ULGA-YP educated new, prospective and current members about the services and programs our affiliate, the Urban League of Greater Atlanta, has to offer, highlighted the ULGA-YP committees, and tested members' knowledge of our organization with fun games and prize giveaways.

May 2021 - Working from Home or the Office: We Still Building Wealth: During this session, attendees heard from Brian Thomas, founder of Fast Track Consulting, on how employees can make the best out of working

from home or the office and still build wealth. We also held elections for our 2021-2022 Executive Leadership Team.

July 2021 – Member Awards and Induction Ceremony: ULGA-YP held its annual Member Awards and Induction Ceremony as the July General Body Meeting. During the event, our outgoing committee chairs presented a recap of their activities for the year, we presented awards for Committee Members of the Year, Man of the Movement, Lady of the League, Committee of the Year, and ELT Member of the Year, and inducted our 2021-2022 Executive Leadership Team.

**August 2021 – Back to Basics:** Guest speaker Breauna Arteese Dorelus, MPA, Chief Cause Consultant at Connecting the Cause, discussed toxic volunteerism, the impact on the communities we serve and strategies to be more conscious servant leaders. We also held a ULGA-YP committee fair where members met our new committee chairs and signed up to serve within the chapter.

**September 2021 - Justice and the YP Movement:** ULGA-YP examined Justice & the YP Movement with a focus on Economic Justice in Atlanta. Participants heard from Abiola (Abbie) Henderson founder of the Gangstas to Growers & the Come-up Project focused on equipping returning citizens with skills to re-engaged with society, create opportunities to address food insecurity through agriculture, while establishing the foundations for



October 2021 – Rules of Engagement: Building Authentic Connections: ULGA-YP members and guests heard from master connector and networking coach, Mr. Ray Abram, about why building authentic connections is important for young professionals to progress, whether for professional or personal relationships.

**November 2021 – YP Roundtable:** To close out 2021, ULGA-YP hosted an authentic and interactive discussion about the chapter and heard a refresher of the 2021-2022 strategic plan as presented by President Brittany Marshall. The meeting was sponsored by Plush Vodka and Boards & Platters.



## Other Leadership Development Initiatives

**TECHTALKS:** An Intro into AWS and Machine Learning: ULGA-YP hosted an interactive session where we took a look into Amazon Web Services capabilities and Machine Learning possibilities. Participants received an intro to the platform and discovered the many ways that this highly used platform may be used in their particular field of expertise. Our discussion was led by Data Consultant/Cloud Engineer Jamarc Hurd, owner of Hurd Consultants and Analytics.

**YP University:** YP University is a series of online personal and professional development workshops aimed to enhance life skills among young professionals. This year, we held YP University sessions focused on career

development featuring presentations facilitated by ULGA-YP members. Career Coaches Kaila Epps, Brett Ellis and Brenda Bridges shared their expertise on personal branding to help participants stand out to employers and the do's and don'ts of virtual interviewing.

**Tapped In: LinkedIn Endorsement Drive:** In order to support our members in their growth personally and professionally, ULGA-YP partnered with Association of Fundraising Professionals Greater Atlanta Chapter to host a LinkedIn Endorsement Drive. Members registered with their LinkedIn profile and the top three skills they want to be endorsed and were then assigned a member from our partner organization to endorse and write Linked In recommendations.

From Segregation to C-Suite: The Black Excellence Panel: ULGA-YP hosted a fireside chat with two executives about their career journey and what it's like to be black elite in corporate spaces. The panel included Milton Little, President and CEO of the United Way of Atlanta and Dia Taylor, Acting Chief Operating Officer of the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention.

**Headshot Happy Hour:** ULGA-YP encouraged members to take their professionalism up a notch with a new headshot and light bites at a socially distanced happy hour.

#### **COMMUNITY IMPACT**

Service is the core component of our theme "Back to Basics: Rebirth. Rebuild. Reconnect", ULGA-YP set out to support the mission and programming of the Urban League of Greater Atlanta and impact the Metro Atlanta community through the empowerment goals of Jobs, Health, Education, Housing, and Justice. This year, ULGA-YP members logged a total of 10,290.4 affiliate service hours.

# **Affiliate and Community Service Initiatives**

**Project Ready Mentorship:** ULGA-YP continued our mentorship initiative to support the ULGA Project Ready program. ULGA-YP members became trained as mentors to impact the lives of Project Ready students, with Advocacy Chair Joshua Gray being recognized as the Project Ready Mentor of the Year. In addition, ULGA-YP members served as volunteers for the 2021 Project Ready Dress for Success event by providing support to affiliate staff the day of the event.

Race to Read 2.0: ULGA and ULGA-YP, along with other organizations, partnered with the Atlanta Public Schools (APS) to launch a public will campaign to engage the community to support APS students to increase their pleasure reading time by 10 million minutes by the end of the school year. As part of the campaign, ULGA-YP members have logged hours towards the initiative, which has recorded close to 7.5 million hours to date. President Brittany Marshall represents ULGA-YP and ULGA on the Race2Read partners call to provide strategic insight on the initiative.

**SHOP-N-SERVE Holiday Service Event**: ULGA-YP in partnership with Walmart, the National Urban League, and CoupleyFit shopped, packed and delivered groceries for 5 families that receive services from ULGA



to celebrate the holiday season and encourage families to be healthier together.

**Signature Events Support:** Vice President, Sandy-Asari Hogan, served as a member of the ULGA Signature Events Committee where she provided insight into the planning for the affiliate's centennial celebration.

**Black Leadership Coalition Participation:** President Brittany Marshall served as a member of the Black Leadership Coalition through ULGA that brings together civic leaders around Greater Atlanta and the State of Georgia to foster collaboration.

**ULGA Policy Council Participation:** President Brittany Marshall and Advocacy Chair Joshua Gray served as members of the ULGA Policy Council to hear from community leaders and discuss issues that are important to the Urban League empowerment goals.

**ULGA COVID-19 Support:** During the COVID-19 pandemic, President Brittany Marshall and Vice President Sandy-Asari Hogan supported affiliate staff by fielding questions via email and answering phone calls of those seeking services from ULGA.

Coats for Kids: ULGA-YP engaged in a winter clothing drive during the winter months to collect new and gently used coats, jackets, hoodies, gloves, scarves, and hoods for children aged 0-18 in support of The Covenant House of Atlanta, a homeless shelter in the city. Coats were sorted and delivered to needy families in February 2021.

**Special Delivery:** The devastating impact the COVID-19 pandemic has had on our seniors is undeniable. ULGA-YP partnered with Meals on Wheels Atlanta to deliver smiles and nourishing meals to low-income and homebound seniors throughout Fulton County.

**MLK Day of Service:** ULGA-YP members celebrated 2021 MLK Day of Service by preparing meals, sorting donations, and assembling housing kits for the homeless population at Partners for HOME.

**H.O.P.E.** in the Hood: As part of Join Week 2021, ULGA-YP joined Everybody Eats Together, a pop-up food market, to serve the historic Ashview Heights community through food distribution and a road clean up. In addition, attendees toured the community and learned about the first planned African American neighborhood in the city of Atlanta.

# **NULYP Participation**

**National Day of Service:** For our 2021 National Day of Service, ULGA-YP partnered with Kids Next Code to offer a Coding and App Design workshop for kids ages 11-18. During this workshop, students learned how to create different game characters, gaming backgrounds, and the fundamental of designing an App. In addition, one lucky student walked away from this workshop with a brand new laptop from ULGA-YP and Kids Next Code.

**National Day of Empowerment:** ULGA-YP partnered with Morris Brown College, an HBCU in Atlanta, Georgia, to deliver a pitch competition and hack-a-thon experience to ULGA-YP members and college students with entrepreneurship ideas, innovations, and creations. Additional partners



included the Urban League of Greater Atlanta, Tapestry Consulting, Morris Brown College, Moore Law, LLC, and Altus Cloud, LLC.

# **Advocacy Initiatives**

**National Voter Registration Week:** As part of 2021 National Voter Registration Week, ULGA-YP partnered with their affiliate, the Urban League of Greater Atlanta, to hold a voter registration drive at a MARTA station to register voters as they entered and exited the subway. A total of 20 voters were registered during the event.

Atlanta Mayoral Debate and Watch Party: ULGA-YP partnered with the six (6) organizations within the Collective for Community Empowerment to host an Atlanta Mayoral Debate, which was broadcast on local television. Representatives from each member organization asked a question on-air related to their organizational mission. The leadership team of each organization gathered for a watch party and were able to network and enjoy dinner and drink specials with one another.

**Neighborhood Planning Unit (NPU) Initiative:** This year ULGA-YP joined forces with the Center for Civic Innovation for the NPU Initiative by signing onto a letter to Mayor Keisha Lance Bottoms calling for a review and revision of the existing NPU structure. In addition, we educated our members around the importance of getting involved in their NPU to drive policy change at the local level. ULGA-YP members reported on happenings at their NPU meetings at our Advocacy Committee meetings.

**State of Young A.T.L.:** This signature ULGA-YP event was curated to deliver a blend of education, advocacy and fun via the Hopin platform. The main stage featured panels with experts on police reform, the digital divide and education and voting rights, in addition to lively roundtable discussions on reparations and healthcare access. Speakers at the event included:

We The People: Next-Gen Georgia's Role in Democracy: As part of Join Week 2021, ULGA-YP hosted a panel discussion to discuss effective ways to stay engaged in the political process and how to hold elected officials accountable on the issues that matter most to our communities.

**NULWB Certificate in Advocacy Program:** This year, ULGA-YP had three (3) members selected to participate in the National Urban League's Congressional Advocacy Program: Christopher Johnson, Henry Wynne, and Meagan Bens.

#### **MEMBERSHIP DEVELOPMENT**

ULGA-YP members are our heartbeat and without them, none of our work would be possible. This year, ULGA-YP worked to ensure that our members experienced a supportive and inclusive environment, were able to participate in events and initiatives that they could not get anywhere else and build lasting connections with one another. We ended 2021 with 184 chapter members. We recruited 72 new members (47% increase in recruitment) and retained 112 members (100% increase in retention).

# **Chapter Operations**

**Surveys and Evaluation:** To ensure we are meeting the needs of our members, ULGA-YP released an inperson events climate survey to our members in 2021 and hosted a members roundtable in late 2021. Feedback from both the townhall and survey were utilized by the Executive Leadership Team to enhance the member experience and programming. In addition, a survey was provided to the Executive Leadership Team as part of their onboarding to drive operational improvements by the President and Vice President.

**Members of the Month:** ULGA-YP members submitted nominations for their peers to be recognized with the Member of the Month award in a People's Choice format. The Membership Committee selected the Member of the Month winners who were presented at General Body Meetings.

**Longevity Recognition:** This year, we have 22 ULGA-YP members who have celebrated 5 years in The Movement. We are beyond thankful for their commitment to ULGA-YP. Collectively, these 22 members represent 148 years of service to the Urban League movement.

**New and Prospective Member Orientation:** This year we hosted two New Member Orientations to introduce participants to the National Urban League movement through an interactive open house format. Each orientation concluded with a toast with participants affirming their commitment to ULGA-YP.

**YPeer Program:** The purpose of the YPeer Program is to accumulate new members to The Movement through a peer-to-peer relationship with a seasoned member. Through the YPeer Program, ULGA-YP aims for new members to build genuine relationships and connections with other ULGA-YP members and learn more about the Urban League and the myriad opportunities for service and philanthropy.

# **Chapter Programming**

Affinity Groups: ULGA-YP has several affinity groups designed to bring together members with common interests. Our Men of the Movement and Ladies of the League affinity groups bring together ULGA-YP members of the same gender to connect with one another around gender issues. Our YPFit affinity group brings together ULGA-YP members with an interest in living their best, healthiest lives. In order to foster self-care during COVID-19, ULGA-YP hosted a YPFit Hike. Lastly, our Book Club connects members who are passionate about books and looking for people to discuss literature with one another. This year, ULGA-YP members enjoyed reading and discussing "The Vanishing Half" by Brit Bennett.



**Empower Hours:** Our Empower Hours are a series of low-key evenings encouraging networking and genuine fellowship among our members in a fun and casual setting. During our Empower Hours, typically following our General Body Meetings, businesses provided personalized food and drink specials for our members, and we were proud to financially support black owned businesses in our community.

**Members Only Meetup:** ULGA-YP hosted a members only, social distanced meet up at Piedmont Park where members engaged in quality networking, community building and fellowship.

**Wine Down Wednesday:** ULGA-YP hosted a virtual mid-week wind down networking event where we played games, listened to music, and had a cocktail demonstration by Maegan Moguel, owner of Tasteful Gatherings. Additionally, members were encouraged to order food from black-owned businesses to be delivered on UberEats.

**Good Skincare Matters:** ULGA-YP hosted a skincare forum where participants heard from Jazz it Upp Skin and Body Spa owner Jasmine Luckey, a registered nurse with more than 15 years of experience who specializes in organic skincare treatments for African American skin. Our speaker shared some helpful tips on proper skincare maintenance and gave a live DIY face scrub demo.

**Paint and Sip**: ULGA-YP hosted a virtual paint and sip where we provided mini wine bottles, charcuterie boards, and an art kit with acrylic paint, paintbrushes, and a pre-sketched canvas.

**THE KICKBACK: Good Vibes Only:** ULGA-YP kicked off Summer 2021 with a members-only social. Each member was allowed to bring one guest and received drink tickets, bites from Amorous Tacos, and sounds from DJ labonita.

**PHILANTHROPIC:** ULGA-YP partnered with Black Millennials 4 Flint and Privileged, LLC for a night of Young, Gifted & Green black excellence in Environmental Justice. This exclusive networking experience for members-only was co-hosted by ULGA-YP, LaTricea D. Adams, MAT, EdS, BM4F Founder CEO & President and White House Environmental Justice Advisory Council Appointee, Founder and Creative Director of Privileged, LLC Jamal Whitlow. The event included opportunities to network with high profile national and local community leaders, politicos, activists, influencers, and policy makers coming together to strategize and organize the Black

+ Latinx Agenda to Act On Climate Change, protect the Black & Brown Vote, secure the bag, and Fight for Environmental Justice.

Create Your Legacy Now: A Tale of Two Wills: ULGA-YP hosted a members-only panel discussion around end of life planning in conjunction with Tapestry Consulting, LLC and Moore Law, LLC in order to dive into how to create a legacy through estate planning and why it is needed.

#### Join Week

ULGA-YP held 5 events in 7 days to expose young professionals across Greater Atlanta to the awesome work of the Urban League Movement and our chapter. With over 150 participants engaged in Join Week, this year, 28 new members joined ULGA-YP and 39 members renewed their membership and commitment to ULGA-YP.

Member Appreciation Drive By (Hosted by Executive Committee): To show their appreciation for your dedication to The Movement, President Michael Twum, Vice President Brittany Marshall, and the elected officers hosted a drive-by on Super Bowl Sunday where members could stop by and pick up lunch, drinks, and YP swag.

Blast into The Future: Diversity in Tech (Hosted by Innovation and Technology Committee): ULGA-YP hosted a General Body Meeting to celebrate the profound movements of tremendous individuals within the tech world. Our panelists shared how to break into the tech field, tech, tech and entrepreneurship and the necessary skills to help any young professional on their journey.

We The People: Next-Gen Georgia's Role in Democracy (Hosted by Advocacy Committee): ULGA-YP hosted a panel discussion to discuss effective ways to stay engaged in the political process and how to hold elected officials accountable on the issues that matter most to our communities.

Black Love: Chicago versus ATL (Hosted by Social and Cultural): This Valentine's weekend game show competition pitted ULGA-YP against the Metropolitan Board of the Chicago Urban League. We introduced eligible singles from each chapter and then competed chapter against chapter in a game of Trap Wars for a chance to win prizes. Additionally, we launched a social media campaign including our respective Presidents, Michael Twum and Kevin Itima, to drum up some friendly competition.

**H.O.P.E.** in the Hood (Hosted by Community Service): As part of Join Week 2021, ULGA-YP joined Everybody Eats Together, a pop-up food market, to serve the historic Ashview Heights community through food distribution and a road clean up. In addition, attendees toured the community and learned about the first planned African American neighborhood in the city of Atlanta.

#### **FUND DEVELOPMENT**

2021 proved to be a year of the pivot. With the looming uncertainty of an ever-changing COVID-19 pandemic, our fund development initiatives gave new meaning to "YP One Stop" as we found new and creative ways to support our Affiliate and the Movement. This year, ULGA-YP created several successful fundraising campaigns and while reimagining key fundraising events to generate revenue. Additionally, we placed special emphasis on securing in-kind donations and corporate and community partnerships. As a result of our efforts, dollars raised for the 2021 totaled \$20,000, and through our affiliate give of \$15,000 coupled with our affiliate service hours totaling 10,290.4, this represents a total cost savings of \$89,605.40 to the Urban League of Greater Atlanta.



# **Giving Campaigns**

**ELT We Give Back:** The #WeGiveBack campaign challenged of our ULGA-YP Executive Leadership Team members to make a thoughtful contribution - be it monthly, one-time, or a portion of the ELT give commitment to ULGA-YP. 100% of the ELT made a financial contribution to ULGA-YP.

**Monthly Giving**: ULGA-YP members have the opportunity to donate funds monthly through a "subscription-style" service. Allowing members to give incrementally, chapter member participated in the monthly giving for the 2021 year giving over \$1400.

**Member Corporate Matching:** This year, we conducted targeted outreach to ULGA-YP members that work at companies with gift matching programs. As a result of our campaign, two members participated in the corporate match in the 2021 year donating \$1065 to ULGA-YP

The COVID-19 Small Business Relief Fund: In response to the ongoing COVID-19 pandemic, ULGA-YP created the COVID-10 Small Business Relief Fund aimed to provide immediate financial relief to Atlanta's small businesses in the form of mini-grants to help with expenses such as rent, payroll, and much more due to reduced cash flow. Corporate sponsor UPS Capital provided an additional \$10,000 after our initial campaign in 2020 to continue our efforts to support our small businesses locally hit hard by the pandemic.

**Georgia Gives Day:** ULGA-YP encouraged our members to make a donation to the Urban League of Greater Atlanta for Georgia Gives Day in Fall 2021.

#### Signature Fundraising Events

**Holiday Soiree:** ULGA-YP hosted its annual Holiday Soiree, this year featuring a whimsical YP in Wonderland theme! Admission included complimentary cocktails from our wonderland themed bar, and fun entertainment such as a DJ, multiple photo booths, themed characters, and decor. With over 110 attendees, young professionals across Greater Atlanta partied with a purpose raising over \$13,075 this year.

**Falling in Love Back in Love with YP:** ULGA-YP wanted to get back to the basics of service and leadership with a night of networking, food, and fundraising. YPs reconnected with YP and one another at this event raising over \$600 to support our mission.

**Dream Catchers:** Each year, we honor college-bound high school students and community heroes during our annual Dream Catchers Scholarship and Awards Reception. With COVID-19 still looming we took our Dream Catchers event virtual! We awarded two (2) scholarships totaling \$10,000 to ULGA Project Ready students and honored three (3) community leaders doing work in the community that uplifts and advances the efforts of the Urban League of Greater Atlanta. In addition, ULGA-YP made a \$5000 donation towards the ULGA Financial Empowerment & Emergency Relief Center (FEERC) to support families impacted by the COVID-19 pandemic.

# Other Fundraising Initiatives

**YP Store:** ULGA-YP continues to provide an online platform for members and supporters to purchase YP swag. Our YP Store continues to grow and provide a means to financially support the organization outside of events and sponsorships. This year, we updated our YP swag to encourage chapter unity and philanthropy raising close to \$1000 through t-shirt sales to date.

**Amazon Smile:** ULGA-YP maintains an Amazon Smile account where a percentage of purchases made by members and supporters are matched by Amazon in a donation. This year, we encouraged our members to make a donation through Amazon Smile for Amazon Prime Day.

# Plugged in w/YP Podcast

The Urban League of Greater Atlanta Young Professionals' podcast "Plugged in w/YP" covers an array of topics from community service to how the Urban League of Greater Atlanta and ULGA-YP are working and showing up in the greater Atlanta community. Episodes were released on a quarterly basis in 2021.

- Episode 1: Our inaugural episode featured President Michael Twum where he discussed the aftermath of the 2020 Election and how to stay engaged moving forward.
- Episode 2: In this episode, we sat down for a personal conversation with Patricia Latimore, who served as the personal assistant to Coretta Scott King for 40 years. Latimore discusses her how she started in

# Strategic Partnerships

Partnerships are key to getting the word out about the great work of the Urban League as well as building a sense of community with other organizations that have a similar mission. This year, we were thoughtful about building partnerships to reach a larger audience that may not necessarily be exposed to our message.

The Collective for Community Empowerment: Founded by Christie Sithiphone, Presidents Michael Twum and Brittany Marshall and Vice President Sandy-Asari Hogan served on board for the Collective for Community Empowerment (CCE). CCE brings together the Presidents and Vice Presidents of key minority young professional stakeholders across Greater Atlanta as a coalition to identify opportunities for partnership and collaboration. The other members of CCE include: Emerging 100 of Atlanta (the young professional auxiliary of 100 Black Men of Atlanta), National Association for Asian American Professionals (NAAAP), Hispanic Young Professionals and Entrepreneurs (HYPE) of the Georgia Hispanic Chamber of Commerce, ACCESS Atlanta (Atlanta Journal Constitution's Jewish Young Professionals), and Metro Atlanta Association of LGBTQ+ Young Professionals (MAAP). During CCE meetings, ULGA-YP leadership reported on upcoming events and weighed in on how other coalition members could support our chapter. Involvement in CCE locked ULGA-YP into a network of close to 1,000 young professionals in Atlanta of diverse backgrounds.

**CDC Young Professionals Network:** ULGA-YP entered a memorandum of understanding (MOU) with the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention's Young Professionals Network (CDC YPN). CDC YPN is the employee resource group for young professionals under 40 at the nation's leading public health agency. Through this MOU, ULGA-YP is able to advertise and promote events and initiatives to all 1,700+ members of CDC YPN via their weekly newsletter, providing access to an untapped demographic in the city.

# **Other Communication Initiatives**

**Website Refresh:** ULGA-YP conducted a usability assessment of our current website to gain feedback on the user experience on the external facing and the internal members-only facing portions of the website. The useability assessment was used to refresh the members-only portal, with plans to update the external website in the coming year.

**Real-Time Membership Metrics on Tableau:** With such a large and robust membership, ULGA-YP continues to utilize a Tableau dashboard that updates every day to give us live information about our membership. This is done in a secure and de-identified way, to protect member personal information, while providing great insights about whom is in our room.

**Text Messages:** Aside from our social media, Slack, and email blasts, ULGA-YP utilized a text messaging platform through our website to message our members about happenings within the chapter.

## NATIONAL DAY OF EMPOWERMENT AWARD



ULGA-YP partnered with Morris Brown College, an HBCU in Atlanta, Georgia, to deliver a pitch competition and hack-a-thon experience to ULGA-YP members and college students with entrepreneurship ideas, innovations, and creations. Additional partners included the Urban League of Greater Atlanta, Tapestry Consulting, Morris Brown College, Moore Law, LLC, and Altus Cloud, LLC.

In order to promote the event, we conducted email outreach to ULGA-YP members via our list serv and to our non-member partner organizations and email subscribers. Our partner, Morris Brown

College, advertised the event on their college campus and the event was disseminated to participants of the ULGA Entrepreneurship Center. In addition, we advertised the event via social media by hosting a video campaign featuring our judges/panelists as they discussed the importance of small, black business. Also, we had an accompanying episode of our "Plugged in w/YP" podcast which launched two weeks prior to NDOE that featured a panel discussion of ULGA-YP members who own their own businesses to discuss their

entrepreneurial journeys.

Prior to the hack-a-thon and pitch competition, attendees heard from Nancy Flake Johnson, President and CEO of the Urban League of Greater Atlanta; The Honorable Thelma Wyatt Moore, Retired Judge and Attorney at Law; Paul McKenzie, MBA, Interim Chair of Business Department at Morris Brown College; and Caroline Templeman, Community Program Manager CBRE at Microsoft around sustainable solutions to black owned businesses in Atlanta and the State of Georgia. Lastly, attendees enjoyed a catered box lunch as part of the event.



The Empowerment Pillars that were emphasized for the event were Education, Entrepreneurship, and Social Empowerment to tie into the NDOE theme of Retooling for Sustainability. Invitations for participants were sent to Clark Atlanta University, Atlanta Technical College, Year Up, and the Atlanta Public Schools by way of Georgia Junior Achievement. Participants were asked to develop a presentation no more than eight minutes long to enhance the offerings of the Urban League of Greater Atlanta's Financial Empowerment and Emergency Relief Center (FEERC). The presentations covered:

- Problem: Clearly identifies the problem that needs to be solved
- Solution: Identifies customer pain points and how they plan to solve the problem
- Business Model: Clearly explains how the company will make money
- Marketing and Sales: Clearly identifies target market and go-to market strategy (distribution channels)
- Next Steps: There is a clear path to move forward with key milestones identified

Participants were judged by our panelists and ultimately, a team of two won a cash prize and the option of having their proposed business registered with the Secretary of State of Georgia and a free hands-on business boot camp training with the affiliate, the Urban League of Greater Atlanta. In total, 25 ULGA-YP members attended NDOE in person with another 25 turning in virtually; ULGA-YP was pleased to be able to offer a hybrid NDOE event. On site, five (5) chapter members volunteered at the NDOE event, with our Economic Empowerment Committee of five additional members coordinating planning and logistics.

#### **PIVOT AWARD**

pream Catchers Scholarship & Awards Reception: Each year, we honor Urban League of Greater Atlanta Project Ready college-bound students and community heroes during our annual Dream Catchers Scholarship and Awards Reception. This is our chapter's signature event and largest fundraiser. In 2020, we were unable to have the event due to the pandemic, however we didn't want another year to go by without honoring our Project Ready students and community leaders so we took our Dream Catchers event virtual for the first time in our chapter's history. The uncertainty of the COVID-19 pandemic allowed ULGA-YP the opportunity to find an innovative and creative way to honor students and community leaders while remaining true to our commitment as a chapter to support the Urban League of Greater Atlanta through our giving and fundraising.



On the heels of a recent resignation of our Fund Development Chair and with COVID-19 at the forefront of our minds, we made the decision to pivot our annual event taking it to the Hopin platform. Using Hopin we were able to curate an experience that mirrored aspects of our in-person event. YP is a about connection! Dream Catchers attendees included a diverse group of individuals from across the Atlanta area and across the Movement. Attendees were able to connect during our pre-reception networking allowing for short "speed-dating like" sessions where YPs were able to meet new or reconnect with old friends. Dream Catchers attendees were also invited to party with a purpose at our event kick-off, where we jammed to the tunes of DJ Jazzy T and offered real time opportunities to support our fundraising efforts.

With this shift to a virtual format, promotion of our largest fundraising event was critical. Our promotions team curated general event, honoree specific, as well as other specialized promotional resources (photo and event copy) that would be shared with event honorees, our event DJ and leadership to share with their networks. This allowed ULGA-YP to expand our reach beyond our current audiences. During the event, our promotions team took the "reception" area to the next level. In the reception area we provided key details about the event agenda and speakers, as well as directed attendees to opportunities to donate in real-time and engage with specially



curated virtual activations. Our team developed activation opportunities that included an event expo that highlighted honoree specific organizations, our event sponsor as well as sharing information about The Urban League of Greater Atlanta, NUL, ULGA-YP and NULYP. Additionally, we created a virtual photobooth equipped with various branded frames that attendees used to mark their participation in the event along with strategically place prompts to tag, share, and like ULGA-YP across our diverse social media platforms and outlets.

Humanitarian, Hometown Hero, and Entrepreneurship honorees and scholarship recipients elevated our virtual event by sharing videos on social media that demonstrated

why they were selected for their respective honors. These videos shared insights into their professional journeys (or their future aspirations), content that showed acceptance of and gratitude for the award while also sharing with attendees why organizations like ULGA-YP are necessary.

#### **Derrick Martin**




